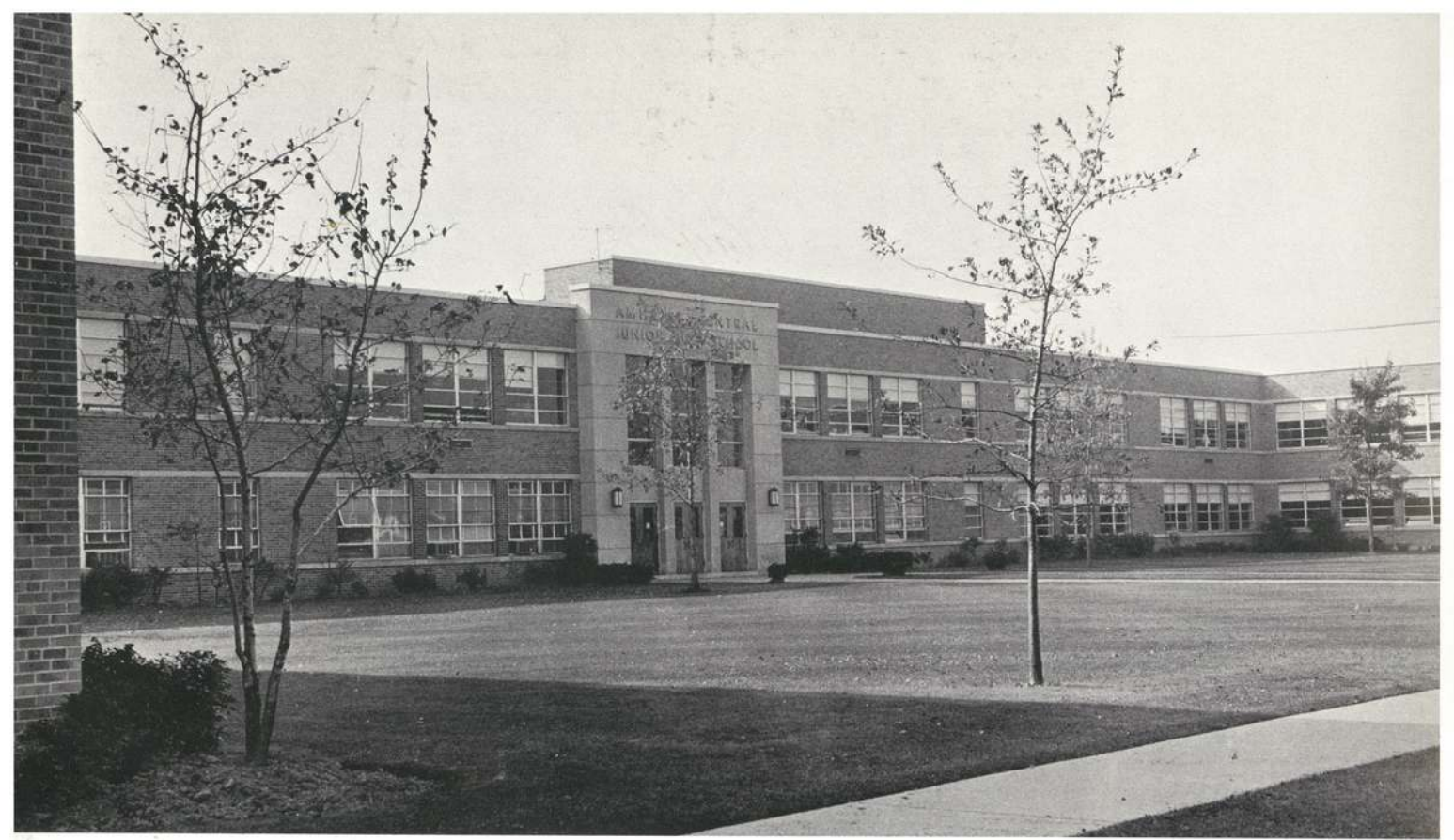

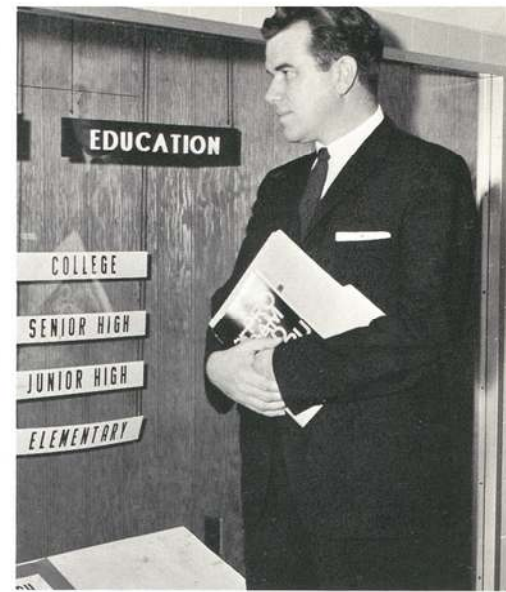


MR. EDWIN C. MUSTARD

The Guidance counselors encourage every student to make the best possible use of his abilities while at the Junior High School. School adjustment is vital to success and the counselor assists students, parents and teachers toward this objective.

The Seventh Grade Counselor supervises the orientation program. In addition, the Counselor assists the parents of Seventh Graders by conducting evening programs for parents. The Counselor devotes many hours helping students who need to make a better adjustment both academically and socially to the Junior High School.

The Eighth Grade Counselor is available for help with problems which demand more time than the classroom teacher can give. The Counselor explains the Ninth Grade program to this group and helps each student with his choice of subjects for the next year.

The Ninth Grade Counselors work with students, parents and teachers for the purpose of planning the high school program. From October through April a student-parent-counselor conference is held with each ninth grader. This is an opportunity for both students and parents to ask questions and to receive counseling concerning the student's achievement, his social adjustment, courses to take for grades 10, 11, and 12, colleges, or any other pertinent information.

Mr. Richard Remy, the school psychologist, is available on Wednesday. He serves as an expert in testing and in helping students and parents to better understand themselves and their school.

The Guidance counselors are persons who are trained and very willing to help any student at any time with questions concerning his program, future educational plans or his social adjustment at school.

KENNEDY DEAD, SHOT BY SNIPER IN TEXAS

Assassin's Bullet Strikes President in a Parade Through Dallas Streets

He Dies of Brain Injury in Hospital Soon Afterward; Governor of Texas Also Is Struck; First Lady Is Uninjured

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 22—President John F. Kennedy, 36th President of the United States, was shot to death today by a hidden assassin armed with a high-powered rifle.

Mr. Kennedy, 46, lived about 12 minutes after the sniper cut him down as his limousine left downtown Dallas.

Automatically, the mantle of the Presidency fell to Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, who had been riding two cars behind the Chief Executive.

Mr. Kennedy died in Parkland hospital, where a bullet-pierced body had been taken in a frantic but futile effort to save his life.

Lying wounded in the same hospital was Gov. John Connally of Texas, who was cut down by the same bullets that ended the life of the President. Connally and his wife had been riding with the President and Mrs. Kennedy.

The First Lady died but was being rushed to a nearby hospital.

It took a quarter of an hour before the Dallas Police and the military police could get to the scene of the shooting.

"Oh, my, the tragedy," Mrs. Connally sighed in his ear beside the President.

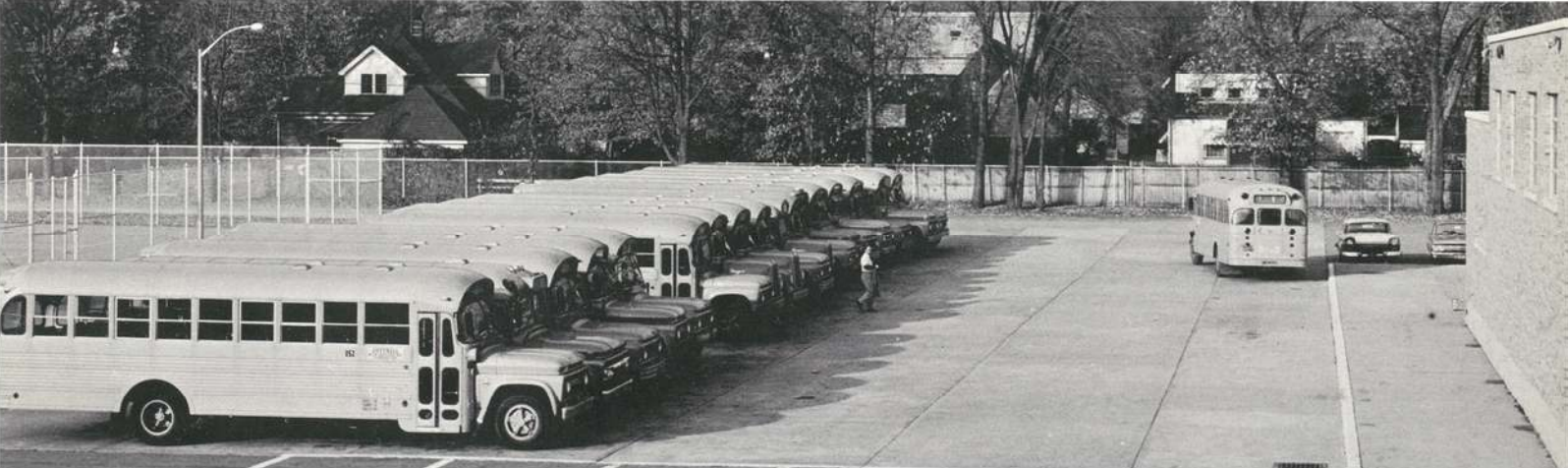

Throngs File Past Kennedy's Bier



History of the Freshman Class

It was September 1961. We were Seventh Graders; wandering aimlessly around what seemed to be such a large, bewildering school. How we sped, later in that year from class to class, fearing a dreaded late pass. Everyone talked of Mr. Edwin C. Mustard, our Principal, whom we never saw that year, because he was on a leave of absence. In his place, taking over the task of guiding the school was Mr. Jan Wittlinger. Of course, as always, there was plenty of work for us.

Summer had come and gone, and we returned to Amherst as the new Eighth Graders. Like all Eighth Graders, we mocked and scorned the Seventh Graders. It was this year, our Eighth Grade year, that many of us attended our first social function, "The Eighth Grade Party," at which Mr. Zacharie Clements, and Mr. Frank Altamura provided music, and Holly Beyer and Steve Becker were crowned Queen and King. This was the year the Ski Club was formed by Mr. Edgar Salfer, our German Teacher, and Mr. Clements. Mr. Mustard finally returned and we were all happy that again the "captain" was at the helm of our ship. Thomas J. Madigan, who had been our assistant principal, left to take a new position in Corning, New York. Somehow we managed to fight our way through the final exams, and, at long last, came the summer.

All too soon came the September of 1963, and with it came the new Freshman Class of Amherst Central Junior High School. The boys were taller, and the girls were blonder, and we were all bronzed from the summer sun. Now we were eager to take over the call of superior and privileged members of the Student Body. Our class was once referred to as the "class of giants" having such towering students as Jack Chesbro, Gary Beebe, Wendy Wolleson, Michael Konczakowski and others. Many of us were much taller than even some of our teachers. Because of this predominant height in our class, and, of course, the physical prowess of the members of the team, the Freshman Basketball Team proved to be very successful. We participated in many social functions ranging from the Honor Society Dance "The Twilight Twirl," to the exciting and yet rather solemn "Freshman Farewell." There was also a Ninth Grade dance, "The Pilgrim Prance," that had been temporarily postponed because of the great tragedy that was experienced by the entire nation with the death of President John F. Kennedy on November 22, 1963. In spite of this loss, life had to go on as did the activities of our class. There was an avid interest in skiing shown by many of the students. The Ski Club was again formed for the second year under Mr. Bernard Deschermeier, a new German teacher, and Mr. Clements. With the Ski Club again in action, came the sprained ankles, frost-bitten toes, broken bones, sore muscles, knickers, expensive ski outfits, death-defying falls, and, of course, students dragging themselves into First Hour class every Wednesday morning half asleep. In February, the Ski Club held a dance for Eighth and Ninth Graders.

Now this year has come to a close and with it, it may seem that the history of our class has come to an end. Please bear in mind that this is only a *chapter* of what we hope will be a continuing story of an active and successful class—the Class of 1967.
